#### Interviews – A Strange Setup

- Two or more strangers together
- Ask and answer session like a test
- Questions focus on life issues





### Interviews – A Strange Setup


- Pressure for "right" answer
- A lot riding on outcome
- Don't get a second chance at first impressions





### Questions you can Expect

- Training & experience
- Likes & dislikes
- Future plans
- Interviewer will be determining your skills for the job and if you're a fit for the company
- Could be one person or a panel
- The honest answer is the "right" answer.





#### **Three-Part Process**

- Establishing rapport
- Gathering information
- Closing





### **Establishing Rapport**

- Treat like a "first date"
- Be yourself
- Avoid canned or "rehearsed" responses
- Be sincere and honest





### Gathering Information

- Questions will focus on background, experience & skills
- Answers should highlight your positive attitude, work ethic, intelligence, and character
- Chance to give examples of your work, life or school successes





### Closing

- Your chance to ask questions
- Ask what are the next steps in process
- Make sure you know
  - When they will make a decision
  - How they will get in touch with you
- Thank the interviewer with a smile
- Exit with confidence





### Things to do – Before Interview

- Research the company
- Learn about the job
- Think about how your experience, skills or attitude qualify you?
- Think about and write down questions you want to ask prior to the interview





### Things to do – Before Interview

- Develop a short commercial about yourself
- Practice it with family or friends
- Gather details on your employment, education, training, work samples. awards, etc.
- Bring proper ID





## Things to do - During Interview



- Arrive early (15 minutes) and alone
- Dress for success appropriate to job
- Relax and be yourself
- Make friendly eye contact



## Things to do - During Interview

- Be pleasant & courteous
- Smile as often as possible
- Express interest in the job
   & company
- Let interviewer lead the interaction
- Give examples of successes





## Things to do - Closing Interview

- Thank the interviewer
- Ask questions on hiring decision
- Reaffirm your interest in the job
- Offer a handshake and appreciation for interview





#### Things to Avoid



- Don't be unprepared or late
- Don't trash former employers – teachers
- Don't lie
- Don't be modest or vague – sell yourself



### Things to Avoid




- Don't eat, smoke, or chew gum
- Don't bring cell phone (turn off)
- Don't overdress dress for the job
- Wear a belt!
- Don't wear excessive colognes, perfumes, or jewelry
- Don't leave without asking questions
- Don't be a pest afterwards



### Inappropriate Questions

- Race
- Age
- Religion, gender
- Health status
- Marital status
- National origin
- Workers' compensation claim history
- Arrest record



You can say, "I'm uncomfortable with that question!"

# How to be successful at a Job Fair!

- Appropriate attire
  - Be timely
  - Have a resume
    - Have a pen
  - Bring your smile
- Apply your soft skills



#### What are soft skills?

Soft skills are personal management skills such as attitudes and behaviors that drive one's potential for growth and team work skills.

#### **Oral Communication**

Don't argue back if you disagree with your employer. Give suggestions or ideas instead – no jargon or slang.

#### **Personal Qualities**

Use good hygiene, comb hair, wear clean clothes, be friendly and polite.

#### Cognitive

• The mental process by which knowledge is acquired. When your supervisor or manager assigns you a specific task, is your work completed and accurate according to the instructions.

#### **Work Ethic**

• Being on time for work, not leaving before your shift is over, being able to work independently without your employer looking over your shoulder, staying focused. Example of poor work ethic: you work in a fast food restaurant and when the boss is not around, you give free food to your friends. This would be grounds for dismissal.

#### Interpersonal

• Being able to communicate with others using written or verbal communication techniques. Example of written: when taking message for co-workers or management, it is important to note the date, time of call, name of caller, company, and brief message. **Rule 9:** Life is not divided into semesters. You don't get summers off and very few employers are interested in helping you FIND YOURSELF. You need to do that on your own time.


Rule 10: Television is NOT real life. In real life people actually have to leave the coffee shop and go to jobs.
